Knowing What Families-In-Crisis Need

The most frequent comment I get about my job at Ronald McDonald House Charities is, "It must be so difficult to work there...with all the sick kids. It must be so sad." In my reply, I always explain that instead, there are many, many reasons why I want be a part of the RMHC team. Two of my biggest reasons are named Drew and Riley...they are my own two sons and they put everything about my work into perspective. Drew is seven years old, a baseball player, fun-loving and much, much smarter than I was at seven. Riley is a newborn baby, four months old, full of smiles, wonder and unconditional love. I look at the families walking through our doors with special children just like my own and all I can think about is how we can make this difficult situation a little easier for them. Looking into the eyes of the

precious children makes it easy to want to take the extra effort to support them as best as we can.

For all of our RMHC staff and volunteers, taking the extra effort means greeting the families with a smile as they walk into our House. It means asking them how they are holding up and really caring what their answer is.

It means making sure that the House is clean, comfortable and welcoming so the families won't have to worry about where they will be sleeping after a long day at the hospital.

It means giving the parents as much support as possible by providing volunteers who will tutor the patients or siblings.

It means scheduling volunteer groups to come up and cook a warm and wonderful meal on Sunday nights so mom and dad don't have to.

It means managers who really take the time to get to know the families--managers who are continually making connections with the guests and creating life-long friendships.

It means taking the extra effort to make sure that this House is a Home.

When I am told that the patient is a young boy, or an infant in critical care, my heart drops thinking that it could be my Drew or Riley at the hospital and me sitting on the other side of the desk. It makes me think about how I would feel in that situation and how I would like to be treated. However, it also makes me think about how wonderful it would feel to be at such a special place as the Ronald McDonald House. Taking care of our guests is rarely "difficult" or "sad" because I can see families like my own, happy and secure while staying here at the Ronald McDonald House.

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A Message from our Executive Director

Hawaii's original Ronald McDonald House on Judd Hillside embodies all that RMHC stands for. Since it began welcoming families in 1987, literally thousands have called it their "Home-Away-From-Home." It is a place where the community's aloha, through us, touches those in need of support during their child's medical emergency. We are so honored to be in that role.

While the House has been in operation for 16 years and has provided for literally thousands of families-in-need, the home itself was built in the 1920s. There have been many upgrades and much thoughtful maintenance over the years, including a construction project in the 1980s that added four more bedrooms, two bathrooms and on-site office space.

Despite proactive maintenance and the loving care of everyone involved, any house nearing 80-years-old needs major upgrades as time takes its toll.

In our case, there is an additional challenge brought on by soil instability in our upslope areas that is threatening to cause a retaining wall to crumble. Should this happen, our Judd Hillside home would be severely damaged and upslope neighbors would also be at risk. To make sure this never occurs, we are acting immediately.

Starting in mid October, the site will be under construction for about 12 weeks. During that time, the first phase of construction—about six weeks—the Judd Hillside House will be closed but no families will be turned away. Thanks to our Dole Street House and our wonderful partnership with Outrigger Hotels, families in need of our services will still be lodged and served during their child's medical emergency.

It may be inconvenient for a few weeks, but the result will be a safe, secure and improved House, better able to address the needs of our precious keiki at a time when they are most vulnerable.

As with our expansion, this construction project is only possible because of community support, so to you and other steadfast members of the community, we thank you on behalf of the hundreds of future families who will be better comforted and supported.

It is always wonderful when former guests stop by the House to visit us when they are in Honolulu.

So, recently, when Ed Pickop and daughter Nalinee came by, the staff was energized by the visit and their success story, which is just one of many.

In 1988, one month after Nalinee was born, she was rushed to Honolulu because of a life-threatening bout with Infantile

Botulism poisoning. While Nalinee was being treated, Ed and his wife Nitaya were guests of Ronald McDonald House. "Now we are kind of like Ronald House ambassadors on Kauai and we pitch in when we can to help raise money or awareness," Ed said during their visit.

Their 1988 stay at RMH is still vivid in Ed's mind. "I remember the support and the great feeling of comfort from the House and people there," he said. "I didn't know there would be such an upside to the emergency we were going through but our experiences at the Ronald McDonald House were very positive and welcomed."

How is 15-year-old Nalinee doing these days? Great. The five-foot five-inch freshman at Kauai High School is on her school's volleyball team and involved in church activities. They were in Honolulu because Nalinee's volleyball team was participating in a tournament here!

Outgoing President's Two-Year Term Bustled with Activity

On June 30, RMHC Board President Everett Kaneshige completed his two-year term and passed the torch to incoming president, Dr. Jay Cambra.

Everett Kaneshige is a well-known risk taker. After all, he gave up a 17-year career as a real estate attorney to start a new business, one that had never been tried before. During a perilous time for start up companies, Kaneshige and his two partners created Hande-e Corporation as they developed "Pocket Real Estate," software that allows real estate agents to access real estate data on their hand held devices. Their program is now used in all 50 states, Canada, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and Guam.

During the past two years, again balancing a vision with just the right calculated risk-taking, Kaneshige oversaw the organization during a turning point in its evolution. The question was how does RMHC keep up with the increasing needs of families facing this special type of medical crisis.

Recently, we had a chance to visit with the busy entrepreneur to reflect back on his term.

Q: How and why did you begin as an RMHC board member?

E.K. I began serving on the board in 1998. Bruce Yanagihara, who was president of the board at that time, invited me to join because of my experience in real estate and business law and RMHC was looking at several projects that would require someone with expertise in these areas.

Q: During that time, how has the RMHC mission changed and why?

E.K. The mission of RMHC remains unchanged. Our primary focus is still to provide a home-away-from-home for seriously ill children and their families, which is done through our cornerstone program, the Ronald McDonald House. What has changed is the tremendous increase in the demand for our services, which we've addressed by developing additional facilities for our families in partnership with organizations such as Kapiolani Hospital, McDonald's and Outrigger Hotels.

Q: Your term as president was certainly an eventful one. What things stand out as most meaningful to you?

E.K. In 1993, we provided 3,532 "nights" for our families. Last year that number was 6,599! Our constituency has also expanded beyond Hawaii to include Guam, Saipan, Samoa, and other locations throughout the Pacific. We would never have been able to serve so many folks from so many places without the services of Jerri Chong, our Executive Director,

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REVISITING SOME FRIENDS

A few issues back, we talked about the great friendship that occurred when, by chance, three outpatient teenaged boys and their mothers all were staying at the Judd Hillside Ronald McDonald House at the same time. Maui mom Cheryl Kin Choy had donated a kidney to her son Wayne Ramos and while they were recuperating at the House they met Olive Aquino and her son Jayven. The Aquinos had come from Molokai to undergo preliminary tests on the way to a possible kidney transplant for Jayven, too. The third teenager, Jonathan Atalig had come all the way from Guam with his mom Anita and was in the midst of aggressive chemotherapy.

During the many weeks they had together and when they weren't undergoing an inpatient procedure, the teens were inseparable. The moms also created a special bond. It is an example of how families staying at the House support each other so well day in and day out.

Well, it's been about a year and we thought you might like to have an update on this trio.

Wayne & Cheryl: They're back home on Maui where Wayne began a new life with his new kidney. Mom Cheryl has recovered fully from the surgery and has even begun working again. Wayne, now 16-years-old, has returned to classes at Baldwin High School and will be entering the 10th grade this fall. How has life changed since the transplant? "Before the transplant, Wayne had to spend hours each day undergoing home dialysis," said Cheryl from their Maui home.

This was bad enough but Wayne also was prevented from doing the things he loved the most—boogie boarding, diving and even fishing—because of the risk of infection. "It was so hard for him to see the ocean everyday and not be able to join his friends. So that was a great thing for him, to return to his ocean sports," she said.

Wayne was a little afraid that his friends would shun him if they knew he had had a transplant, and was reluctant to tell them. But at mom's urging he shared the news

and instead of not understanding, his friends were excited and happy for him. "They're always watching out for him now," reported a happy Cheryl.

Jonathan & Anita: Jonathan's cancer is being managed well enough allowing him to now remain home in Guam, where Make-A-Wish Foundation-Guam granted him a shopping spree. "He didn't get much for himself," mom Anita said from their home in Guam. "He picked things for other people, that's the way he is."

Recently, he was awarded his high school diploma and is even beginning to test the job market there. "I'm doing really well," Jonathan said. "I'm able to do more things, it's just that sometimes I get kind of tired."

Anita and Jonathan still must come back to Honolulu periodically for follow up tests and continuing treatments but, showing the maturity of someone much older than his 17 years, Jonathan's outlook stays patient—and positive.

Jayven & Olive: Jayven was placed on the waiting list for a kidney and he and his mother learned how to perform home dialysis. They returned to Molokai to wait. The Aquino's wish just came true in July. In fact, as this is being written, Jayven and Olive are once again staying at the Judd Hillside House while Jayven heals from the surgery and doctors watch closely for any signs that his body is rejecting his new kidney. "We're just waiting for the doctor to tell us we can go home," says Olive.

As often is the case with transplants, Jayven and Olive had very little time to pull together some clothes and scramble to get to Honolulu. "We had about an hour notice," Jayven recalled. "It was like wait, wait, wait and then all of a sudden hurry. Very exciting," he says.

Jayven's patience has been rewarded and, if all goes well, he too will soon know the joy of participating in his favorite activities once again and being able to regain the normalcy in life that he wants so much. "I miss things like working in the yard, carrying boxes...physical things," Jayven says.

and her staff who have done a magnificent job and, of course, all of our volunteers who have contributed countless hours of their time. In terms of milestones, the following stand out:

- Opening the Ronald McDonald House Family Room in Kapiolani Hospital so that families from Oahu who don't usually stay at our facilities would have a home-away-from-home to go to.
- Developing a second facility that focuses more on the needs of parents of premature infants and initiating the process to turn it into an additional Ronald McDonald House.
- Completing the interior renovations at the original Ronald McDonald House on Judd Hillside that has been in service for 16 years and working on additional improvements so that it can continue to last at least that long.
- Laying the groundwork for a multimillion-dollar capital campaign so that the organization can meet its financial goals.

Q: As you handed over the presidency to Dr. Cambra what advice did you give him?

E.K. No advice needed. I've had the privilege of working with Jay Cambra over the last couple of years and found him to be a bright and caring individual who is committed to the mission and success of RMHC and its families. He is going to be an outstanding president of the board of directors.

Q: How do you envision RMHC five years from now?

E.K. We are blessed to have a dynamic board of directors along with a magnificent professional staff and a wonderful group of volunteers. With this combination, I really believe the sky is the limit in terms of what the organization can accomplish five years from now. I do think that partnerships with other charities, companies and even government, will be the key to allow us to assist our families in their own communities in addition to providing sanctuary for them when the children are hospitalized.

Q: Any amusing anecdotes from your presidency?

E.K. A couple of years ago a group of board members and staff went to Maui to help McDonald's promote RMHC as part of the Hula Bowl. I was selected to work in the hot dog booth bagging hot dogs. I did the exact same thing for a jaycees group at the Diamond Head Crater Festival many years ago. That certainly brought back memories, primarily as to how many things have changed since that time, but a hot dog is still a hot dog.

Q: Where do you envision yourself five years from now?

E.K. Back on the board again if they'll have me.

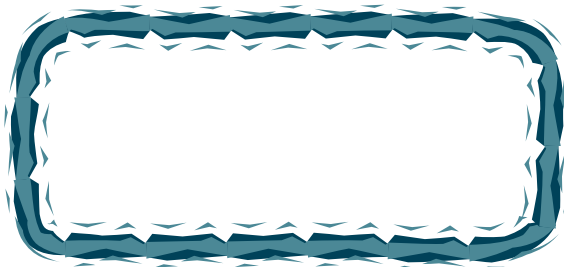
